#### Message from Leah Ettarh, Executive Director

GLOBAL COOPERATION

As of the time of writing on 15 October 2020, 1,089,047 people worldwide have died of Covid-19. We must first take a moment to reflect, and acknowledge our collective sadness for the many individuals who have lost their lives, who will lose their lives, and the families and communities impacted. The ripple effects of the virus on our economies and social systems continue to grow, and the significant social progress made over the previous decades is at risk of being reversed.

We continue to work within our coalition to lobby the Federal Government to increase aid and #EndCovidEverywhere. A special online day of action took place on 1 September 2020, when ACGC joined other Cooperation Canada members [formerly CCIC] to call on Canada to commit at least 1% of its total Covid-19 response – or \$2 billion in new and additional funds – to a global response that tackles the spread of the virus and its secondary impacts on the poorest countries. These efforts are paying off. On September 29th, the Federal Government announced an additional \$400 million to build resilience and to address short-term international humanitarian and development needs.

Unfortunately, the trend in Alberta towards government support for international efforts is not as positive. Over the summer, we analysed decades of data from the Government of Alberta and published a new report: **The Alberta International Development Program: An Analysis of Data from 1974-2019.'** We worked to better understand the program's history and scope, as well as the impact that it had across the globe. The high-level findings are included in this newsletter, while the full report is available on our website. ACGC will be sharing this report with key government and sector stakeholders in an effort to increase awareness of this important fund and to find ways to reinstate it.

But while we are still in the midst of uncertainty, we find hope in the daily acts of solidarity, stories of resilience, and the incredible commitment of people all over the world to breaking down barriers and working together to end the crises for all. We are extremely moved by the actions of ACGC members in addressing the impacts of Covid-19 in Alberta and globally, which ten organizations shared through blogs, videos, podcasts, and images on ACGC's Together Alberta blog at together.acgc.ca/the-stories.

The financial impacts of Covid-19 on government budgets will be felt for decades to come, but ACGC is committed to raising our voice and advocating that Canada not only maintain, but increase its official development assistance. As organizations for global social justice, we have the responsibility to harness this moment, centre the voices of the most vulnerable, and expedite the transformational community changes we have been fighting for.

### ACGC releases report on the Alberta International Development Program

ACGC is pleased to release the results of a year-long analysis of the **Alberta International Development Program** that was funded by the Government of Alberta for 45 years.

Key Findings:

Over 45 years (1974-2019), the Alberta Government funded 6,892 international assistance projects in at least 85 countries at a total expenditure of \$117,356,825, while further mobilizing \$519,541,030 in private donations towards these projects from Albertans.

In the last decade of the program (2009-2019), the Alberta Government funded 709 projects: 38% focused on education, 18% on health, and 15% on basic social services. Across all project types, 10% addressed issues of gender equality and the rights of women and girls. The regions receiving the largest share of projects and funding in the last decade included Eastern Africa (27%), Southern Asia (20%), and Central America (15%).

Between 2009-2019, funding was provided to 218 unique Alberta organizations located in 44 communities across the province. While the Canadian federal government is the primary source of government funding for international development projects, only 7 organizations of the 218 that qualified for funding from the Alberta government were successful in obtaining federal funding in the same period.

With this evidence, it can be concluded that Alberta's international development program was an invaluable mechanism to bolster the many efforts of Albertans working to reduce poverty, address inequality, and support sustainable development in communities worldwide.

ACGC maintains a strong commitment to supporting global citizenship education in Alberta through providing professional development opportunities for Alberta teachers.

During the long period when schools were closed, from March - June 2020, ACGC responded by providing an opportunity for community building, discussion, and learning about gender equality through hosting an educator reading circle. ### Annual Conference: Unlearning and Relearning: International Development Beyond 2020

From September 23rd to 25th, ACGC successfully held its first virtual annual conference entitled Unlearning and Relearning: International Development Beyond 2020. 138 participants from Alberta, Canada, and around the world participated in 3 days of keynote addresses, panel discussions, research analysis and networking via Zoom. Participants explored topics of racism, inequality and privilege in the international development sector; women and girls and their experiences of the Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent government and civil society responses around the world, and finally issues of funding and funding gaps for international development in Alberta. The conference engaged ACGC members, youth across Alberta and speakers from the US and across Canada.

A highlight was the keynote address by Angela Bruce Raeburn, an author and speaker, and currently regional advocacy director for Africa at the Global Health Advocacy Incubator. Angela spoke about her experiences of racism in the international development sector, and addressed what individuals and organizations in the sector can do to examine structural racism and representation in their work at home and abroad.

ACGC member organizations participated on a panel addressing the experiences of women and girls around the world during the Covid-19 pandemic. At the panel, they showed a video prepared in collaboration with women from project countries around the globe, where organizations have been responding to Covid-19 and the societal needs that have arisen from the pandemic. Spur Change has been extremely busy, responding to the needs of Small and Medium organizations during the Covid-19 crises. During summer and early fall, Spur carried out their National Training on Making Data Collection Meaningful and continued their COVID-19 capacity development series.



Currently, Spur is delivering a Gender Learning Series on topics related to feminist and gender sensitive MEAL and innovative solutions. They also began a new series for educators, beginning with a webinar on the Future of Global Citizenship Education Post-Covid.

#### FIT announces Recipients of Second Round of Funding

Nine organizations from across Canada were amongst the second cohort selected on 30th September 2020 to test innovative solutions that will improve the lives of women and girls in developing countries.

"Throughout our first two intakes, we've seen so many great Canadian organizations working towards improving the lives of women and girls from around the world," said Christina MacIsaac, Director of Innovation for FIT. "We are confident that the results of the selected innovative solutions will have lasting impacts for all involved, including here in Canada and within the testing countries."

Within Alberta, ACGC member CAUSE Canada's project "Eradicating Child Marriage in Sierra Leone" was selected. CAUSE Canada will be testing an innovative approach to eradicate child marriage by educating men seeking child brides about the negative consequences of child marriage for them, their families, and entire communities. The solution being tested includes training community leaders, empowering advocates, organizing community events against child marriage, and collecting data on the number of prevented marriages vs. marriages that took place despite the intervention.
